

When? Friday 3/16, 4:30 - 6:30pm



2nd Year, Clinical Area, Diversity Issues Committee Student Representative, UGSP Undergrad Outreach Committee Co-Chair

Blanche Wright is a Los Angeles native and first-gen college graduate (UCLA), who has observed the lack of attention to mental health in her Latinx culture. Through the lens of Dissemination and Implementation Science, she works alongside Dr. Anna Lau to examine disparities that may exist in the quality of publicly-funded mental health care for Latinx youth and their parents. Facilitated by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Health Policy Research Scholars (HPRS) program, Blanche has recently been matched with a career coach, Dr. Margarita Alegría (Massachusetts General Hospital; Harvard), who is a renowned disparities expert. In HPRS, Blanche is gaining leadership skills and didactic training in Public Health; she hopes to utilize her growing knowledge base in applied work that focuses on closing the research to policy gaps, improving the quality of care for Latinx families and ultimately, contributing to the progress of achieving mental health care equity. In the department, Blanche co-chairs UGSP's Undergraduate Outreach Committee, and feels honored to develop and host events for the undergraduate population that she once was a part of. She also is a student representative on the Diversity Issues Committee; currently, she is working with a small group of students to create a safe space to address the sociopolitical climate's growing impact. Next year, Blanche is excited to serve as a bilingual community therapist at Children's Institute Inc. and to give back to her hometown in a small albeit valuable way.



Gerald Higginbotham

2nd Year, Social Area, Diversity Issues Student Representative, UGSP Treasurer

I was born and raised in St. Louis, MO, but since high school, I have lived primarily in California. I've lived as far north as the Bay for undergrad to Long Beach for the two years I worked between undergrad and grad school. I am now a second-year in the Social area working with Dr. Tiffany Brannon. Broadly, I am interested in how cultural representations (e.g., in media, history) shape self and identity from an intragroup perspective and can shape perceptions of others from an intergroup perspective, with a particular focus on educational contexts.

I would argue that my focus on representation and its relevance to identity is linked to my mentorship experiences. Throughout undergrad and graduate school, I have done my best to share my path and help illuminate the educational and career possibilities for younger students. Last summer, I had the great opportunity to collaborate with a **UCLA Vice Provost initiative program** that focuses on increasing Black and Latino high school students' exposure and access to college. I was able to talk to the high school scholars about how psychology research can be used to

understand issues they are passionate about and that they view as relevant to their communities. Now, in terms of my interest in the intergroup aspects of representation, I can point to the specific origin. I had very early experiences in my undergraduate education that illustrated why representation matters. Coming from a majority Black community in St. Louis, I was surprised that many of my new undergrad peers had few, if any, Black friends at home. Most shocking to me at the time however, was that my peers had well-(mis)informed ideas about "what Black people are like," rooted in the representations to which they had been exposed (e.g., media) or not exposed (e.g., Black history).

Thus, I do think is vital to consider and seek to understand what representation means for both ingroup and out-group members, as well as the implications for intergroup interactions. In collaboration with my advisor, I am excited to continue exploring these ideas in my primary projects, such as my work related to Black male achievement.
